This week, students in Years 3 and 5 will begin NAPLAN tests. The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.

It is a nationwide measure through which parents/carers, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

NAPLAN results allow parents/carers and educators to see how students are progressing in literacy and numeracy over time – individually, as part of their school community, and against national standards.

The results can assist teachers by providing additional information to support their professional judgement about students' levels of literacy and numeracy attainment and progress.

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process and do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance. Each teacher will have the best insight into their students' educational progress. Parents/carers can use NAPLAN reports, along with other school assessment reports, to discuss their child's strengths and areas for improvement with their

All students have had a go at practice tests through the public demonstration site so they are familiar with the format of the tests. We remind students that this is just another assessment task at school, nothing to worry about and to just do their best.

P&C Easter raffle



JUNIOR CLASSROOM



This week in the Junior class, students will be continuing their text studies; stage 1 The Sail and the Whale and Kindergarten The Wild Guide to Starting school. Students will also be looking at how storyboards can be used to plan their Writing.



In mathematics, students will be immersed into the world of 2-Dimensional shapes, how we can describe them, identify and use them to create patterns.

From the Senior Classroom

In English this week, students will continue the process of improving their narrative writing through the use of 'sizzling starts.' They will use images as prompts to write a sizzling start in no more than four sentences. Keeping the number of sentences low means students really have to think about how to use powerful vocabulary to say what they want. I can't wait to see what they will produce.

We are almost half-way through our class text now and as the story unfolds, students are demonstrating excellent comprehension skills and insightful deductions about the characters in the text. I have been particularly pleased to see how they have been able to relate a text set in the 1930s to present times and draw reflective comparisons between the two.

In Mathematics this week, we will be looking at multiplicative relations. Having a strong understanding of multiplication tables, doubling and halving and the relationship between multiplication and division, supports so many other aspects of mathematics, eg calculating area. In the senior class, we practise random multiplication facts every day as part of our daily review – a recap on prior learning and quick-fire fact retrieval.

Our afternoons this week will be all History focused. Students are now working in groups to research facts relating to the Gold rush and examining what life would have been like for people living on the goldfields at that time.

Add in Sport, Scripture, PDH and, of course, NAPLAN tests for some students, and it's going to be a very busy week indeed!
